Mayor's Message 2009 Fall Newsletter

As most of you know, my term as Mayor expires on December 31, 2009. In our form of government the Mayor is selected each year by the Township Committee. That will happen this year at the reorganization meeting during the first week of January 2010.

So I would now like to share with you some of my thoughts and experiences while serving as your Mayor.

I volunteered to serve the town as a payback. A payback for all the wonderful luck and good fortune I have enjoyed during my entire life. I believe that anyone as fortunate as I, owe a debt to society or the universe in general. This has been my way of trying to repay that debt. I wanted to make a difference. I had no personal agendas or self serving interests.

I serve without pay and I do not collect health benefits. On the other hand, I have incurred considerable personal expenses and spend the better part of each day working for the town. I have always made Town business my first priority and personal needs secondary. In addition, I have paid the price of sleepless nights and frustration. But the most costly of all was the loss of friendships.

If asked to describe my strongest emotion as Mayor I would have to say the feeling of tremendous responsibility... the realization that the welfare of individuals and the entire township depends on the actions of me and my fellow committee people.

In terms of accomplishments I influenced the development and execution of a performance review procedure for all employees, I helped to fight against the lines and the Riverbank Pumped Storage Project, I supported the ordinance to preserve the rural quality of the Town, I fought to reduce the budget and hold taxes, I created the weekly Mayor's information Newsletter, I continue to support the fight against the towers and the PSE&G power lines and I am a big advocate of transparent government and openness to the public.

In addition, I served as the liaison to the Senior Citizen's, the Police Department, the Department of Public Works and represented the town at various ceremonial functions. But most enjoyable of all was the opportunity to perform five marriages and one civil union ceremony.

Next year, I believe we will have two major challenges; (1) to fulfill the pledge made to COAH to build the promised affordable housing units and (2) to produce a budget which will avoid additional tax increases in this still weak economy.

So what positive do I take from this experience? ... the feeling that I did my best to serve the people of the community, the belief that I voted for what I thought to be in the best interest of the town and the satisfaction that I was always true to myself.

In closing I can now add the following to my Bucket List:

"Once upon a time I was the Mayor of a very wonderful town in Northern New Jersey called Andover Township".

MISCELLANEOUS INFORMATION

TOWN HALL HOLIDAY CLOSING	Town hall will be closed in observance of upcoming holidays on the following dates: November 26 and 27 (Thanksgiving); December 25 (Christmas); January 1 (New Years Day); January 18 (Martin Luther King's Birthday); February 12 (Lincoln's Birthday); February 15 (President's Day); April 2 (Good Friday); May 31 (Memorial Day).
DPW INFORMATION	During the next few months, the Department of Public Works will be checking township roadways for overgrown trees and limbs. They will then start trimming any overgrown or unsafe brush in anticipation of snow removal from the roadway. If you have any questions regarding this procedure, please call Darren at 973-383-4280, ext. 225.
LEAVES	Leaves will be picked up during the month of November only. All leaves <i>must</i> be put in large paper (recyclable) leaf bags. <u>Plastic bags are not acceptable.</u>
BRUSH PICK UP	Brush pick up will be October 1, 2009 through April 15, 2010 , weather permitting. The cut end of the brush must be facing the roadway and be neatly piled, not crossed. The maximum diameter of limbs is 3 inches. For safety reasons, thorn bushes and briar bushes will not be picked up. Please note: brush pick up is for our <i>residents' convenience</i> when clearing away overgrown trees and bushes, or when storm damage occurs. We do not have the man power or large machinery to pick up huge amounts of brush. Any commercially cut trees or bushes causing an abundance of brush can not be picked up by our DPW crew. The SCMUA Recycling Center located on Rte. 94 in Lafayette is available to all residents. Their phone number is 973-579-6998.
CHRISTMAS TREE DROP OFF	Residents may bring discarded Christmas trees to a designated point in the lower parking lot at Hillside Park, Lake Iliff Road, during the month of January . When weather permits, the trees will be chipped into mulch and will be available to all residents. Christmas trees will not be picked up curbside.
WASTE OIL DROP OFF <i>Motor Oil Only</i>	Drop off is the last Friday of each month, EXCEPT for Holidays of November 27 and December 25 – would be the week before, between the hours of 8:00 - 10:00 A.M. at the Municipal Garage (upper parking lot), 134 Newton-Sparta Road. <u>Please do not drop off the motor oil at any other time.</u>
OVERNIGHT PARKING/ SNOW REMOVAL	Local Ordinance 10-10B restricts the parking of vehicles on any roadway in the Township between the times of 10 PM and 6 AM. This ordinance is in effect each year from November 15 th to April 15 th of the following year. The police department requests that if a vehicle needs to be parked on the roadway, a call be placed to the police department by the vehicle owner.
OBSTRUCTION TO STREETS	No person shall deposit, throw, spill or dump dirt, ashes or other material upon any street or highway in the Township. No person shall divert, obstruct or interfere with the normal flow of surface waters in any gutter, drain or ditch along any street or highway of the Township, nor in any way cause the normal flow of water to be stopped, diverted from or overflow the gutters, drains or ditches. The Department of Public Works appreciates your cooperation.
AFTER HOURS PAYMENT DROP BOX	As a convenience to our residents, we have installed an outdoor payment "drop box" on the pillar near the front entrance to the Municipal Building. This secure receptacle can be used at any time to leave payments or correspondence for any Andover Township Department. Payments left after 3:30 PM will be credited to the next business day.

DOG LICENSING: If you need assistance or information, please call 973-383-4280, Ext. 231. Failure to secure a current dog license could result in the issuance of summons.

REMINDER: *Puppies* must be licensed by 7 months of age. Also, any dog acquired during the year must be licensed within 10 days. All new residents owning dogs, which do not carry a current NJ license, must obtain one within 10 days. All licenses must be renewed every January. **Late fees of \$5 per month** per dog will be assessed to any license renewed after January 31.

IMPORTANT – Please continue mailing in renewal information. If your dog is currently licensed you will receive a renewal application. Include a self addressed stamped envelope; copy of recent rabies certificate, spay/neuter certificate. **Please do not mail 2010 Dog License renewals before December 28, 2009.**

FREE RABIES CLINIC DATES: The rabies clinic will be held on Friday, January 8, 2009 at the Municipal Garage, 134 Newton-Sparta Road. **Dogs** will be scheduled for **5 to 7 PM**. **Cats** will be scheduled from **7 to 8 PM**. In case of inclement weather, listen to WNNJ or WSUS for cancellation. Rescheduling will follow.

Dog licensing will not be available at the time of the clinic. At this time, Andover Township does not require licensing for cats; however, be sure they are protected with a rabies shot. **The State mandates that the rabies immunization not expire before November 1 of the licensing year.**

RECREATION ACTIVITIES

HOLIDAY BUS TRIP INTO NYC: At the time this newsletter was being printed, seats were still available for the annual bus trip to the Big Apple on Saturday, December 5th for holiday shopping, sightseeing, theater, museum visits, etc. The bus fee for Andover Township residents is \$10 for each seat. For nonresidents the fee is \$20 for each seat. The bus will depart from the Florence M. Burd School at 8 a.m. and will depart NYC at 6 p.m. for the return trip home. HOLIDAY PARTY: Annual children's Holiday Party, Hillside Park Hall, Sunday, December 6th. Doors open at 1:15 PM and the Andover Regional School Chorus will provide the entertainment. We expect Santa to visit at approximately 2 PM. Each child will receive a gift and refreshments will be available for everyone.

SUSSEX COUNTY YMCA PROGRAMS: The Township continues to partner with the YMCA by offering programs on Wednesday mornings at the Hillside House. The next schedule of programs begins on Wednesday, December 2nd and will run for 8 weeks ending on Wednesday, January 20, 2010. The tentative schedule is 10 am – Adult Yoga (\$64 Andover Twp. Residents and Y members; \$96 all others); 11 am – Mommy and Me (\$56 Andover Twp. Residents and Y Members; \$84 all others); 12 pm – Chair Yoga (\$64 Andover Twp. Residents and Y members; \$96 all others). Please call the YMCA for registration at 973-209-9622.

YOGA EVENING CLASSES: Sunari Yoga, LLC provides evening Yoga Classes under the direction of Darlene Cooper, RYT member of Yoga Alliance at the Hillside House. The program runs on Tuesday and Thursday evenings beginning at 6:30 pm. The current classes began the first week of November and will run for 6 classes with the Tuesday class ending on December 8th and the Thursday class ending on December 17th. You can sign up for one or both of the classes at \$10 per class for a total of \$60 each. You are welcome to join at any point during the schedule. LADIES AEROBICS/BODY SHAPING CLASSES: A winter session of aerobics will be held at the Hillside Hall on Monday and Thursday evenings from 7-8 pm. We will begin on Monday, December 21st and continue for 20 classes ending on Thursday, March 4th. There will be no classes on December 24th and 31st. The fee for 20 classes is \$20 for township residents or \$40 for non-residents. We will limit class size to 25. You are responsible for providing your own equipment.

ANDOVER TOWNSHIP DAY: Saturday, May 22, 2010 at Hillside Park will be the date of our Andover Township Day Celebration. We will begin with a parade for the children from Long Pond School to the park at 2 PM with opening ceremonies at 3 PM. We are planning many fun activities for both children and adults including a petting zoo, pony rides, carnival games, bounce house, Nascar Race Track, large obstacle course and other rides plus live music by 2 bands along with great food at affordable prices. We invite Andover Township non-profit organizations to join the celebration by manning a booth or other activity that will benefit your organization as well as be of interest to our residents. HILLSIDE PARK: The Recreation Committee would like to bring to your attention a recent honor the township received by being rated among the "Best of the Best" by the Playground Guide – Best of Sussex and Warren Counties. We received a 5 Star rating which is the highest given. We are proud of our beautiful facility and appreciate the work done by our Road Department personnel in keeping it in tip top shape. HILLSIDE HALL & HILLSIDE HOUSE: Reminder to residents that the Hillside Hall is available for rental when it is not being used for township activities. The room can hold up to 300 people, but we offer tables and chairs for just under 200 guests. It has a full kitchen and large dry bar. It is air conditioned and heated. Rental fee for township residents is \$300 with a security deposit fee of \$500. If no damage is reported after your use, you will be reimbursed the \$500 in a township check. The building adjacent to the Hillside Park Hall, now known as the Hillside House, has recently been renovated and also can be rented when it is not being used for township activities. It is suitable for meetings and small parties (capacity is 50 people). It is equipped with a refrigerator, small wet bar area and microwave. It is air conditioned and heated. Township residents can rent this space for \$150 with a security deposit fee of \$250, return of which is handled the same as the Hall. Both buildings are open for rental from March 1st to December 31st of each year. Please call the Recreation Office for rental information.

<p>Electronics Recycling: Sussex County MUA offers free disposal days for televisions, computers, printers, etc. If you need to dispose of these items any other time, the SCMUA charges a small fee. <i>Residents are responsible for destroying media.</i></p>	<p>No Construction Material allowed. Also no asbestos, hazardous materials, tires, batteries, wet paint, or chemicals allowed. For disposal information of these materials, please call The Sussex County Municipal Utilities Authority (SCMUA) Facility at 973-579-6998. They are located at 34 South Route 94, Lafayette.</p>
<p>Heavy Bulk Items – Carpeting (must be rolled and tied), Sofas, Mattresses, Playground Equipment (pieces no larger than 4 feet), Furniture, Ovens/Ranges, Hot Water Heaters and non-freon appliances. All paint cans must have lids removed and paint must be totally dry. Bulk items will be picked up every Wednesday <i>with a limit of 350 pounds per residence.</i></p> <p>Freon Appliance: Refrigerators and Freezers (doors removed), Air Conditioners and dehumidifiers - will be picked up by appointment only on the last Wednesday of every month. If you have one of these appliances to be picked up, please call Robyn at the Municipal Building (973-383-4280, ext. 224) to arrange for removal.</p>	<p>Collection items should be placed curbside no sooner than 24 hours prior to pick-up. Please do not block the roadway when placing items curbside.</p> <p>Trash - Appropriate container size is 32 gallons with a limit of 2 per week for trash.</p> <p>Recycling - must be placed in a reusable container no larger than 32 gallons with exterior handles (no 55 gallon drums or homemade containers). No plastic bags allowed. Corrugated goods must be flattened and cannot contain any other packing material (peanuts and Styrofoam, etc.). Newspapers and magazines can either be crossed tied and bundled or put in a permanent container with other fiber recycling.</p>

Stormwater Management

<p><u>A Guide to Healthy Habits for Cleaner Water</u></p> <p>Pollution on streets, parking lots and lawns is washed by rain into storm drains, then directly to our drinking water supplies and the ocean and lakes our children play in. Fertilizer, oil, pesticides, detergents, pet waste, grass clippings: You name it and it ends up in our water.</p> <p>Stormwater pollution is one of New Jersey's greatest threats to clean and plentiful water, and that's why we're all doing something about it.</p> <p>By sharing the responsibility and making small, easy changes in our daily lives, we can keep common pollutants out of stormwater. It all adds up to cleaner water, and it saves the high cost of cleaning up once it's dirty.</p> <p>As part of New Jersey's initiative to keep our water clean and plentiful and to meet federal requirements, many municipalities and other public agencies including colleges and military bases must adopt ordinances or other rules prohibiting various activities that contribute to stormwater pollution. Breaking these rules can result in fines or other penalties.</p>	<p>As a resident, business, or other member of the New Jersey community, it is important to know these easy things you can do every day to protect our water.</p> <p>Limit your use of fertilizers and pesticides.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Do a soil test to see if you need a fertilizer. • Do not apply fertilizers if heavy rain is predicted. • Look into alternatives for pesticides. • Maintain a small lawn and keep the rest of your property or yard in a natural state with trees and other native vegetation that requires little or no fertilizer. • If you use fertilizers and pesticides, follow the instructions on the label on how to correctly apply it.
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<p><u>Properly use and dispose of hazardous products</u></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Hazardous products include some household or commercial cleaning products, lawn and garden care products, motor oil, antifreeze, and paints. • Do not pour any hazardous products down a storm drain because storm drains are usually connected to local bodies of water and the water is not treated. • If you have hazardous products in your home or workplace, make sure you store or dispose of them properly. Read the label for guidance. • Use natural or less toxic alternatives when possible. • Recycle used motor oil.
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<p><u>Keep pollution out of storm drains</u></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Municipalities and many other public agencies are required to mark certain storm drain inlets with messages reminding people that storm drains are connected to local bodies of water. • Do not let sewage or other wastes flow into a stormwater system. <p><u>Clean up after your pet</u></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Clean and plentiful water is important to our families, our environment, our economy and our quality of life. Did you know that animal waste from pets can pollute our waters? When left on the 	<p>ground, pet waste is washed by rain and melting snow and ice into storm drains that carry it to our rivers, lakes, bays, the ocean and drinking water. Animal waste contains a high concentration of nutrients as well as bacteria and disease-causing microorganisms that can cause problems.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Pick up and properly dispose of pet waste dropped on public or people's property. • Use newspaper, bags or pooper-scoopers to pick up wastes. • Dispose of the wrapped pet waste in a toilet. • Never discard pet waste in a storm drain. 	<p><u>Don't litter</u></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Place litter in trash receptacles. • Participate in community cleanups. • Recycle. Recycle. Recycle. <p><u>Dispose of yard waste properly</u></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Keep leaves and grass out of storm drains. • Follow Andover Township's yard waste collection rules. • Use leaves and grass clippings as a resource for compost. • Use a mulching mower that recycles grass clippings into the lawn.
